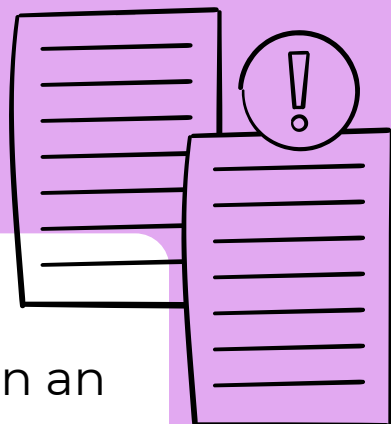


Avoiding Plagiarism in Your Final Project



What is plagiarism?

Plagiarism, or academic dishonesty, in an academic context means **using someone else's work, ideas, or words as your own.**

When does plagiarism occur?

You commit plagiarism when you:

- **Copy sentences, phrases, paragraphs, or ideas from someone else's work** (published or unpublished) without giving proper credit.
- **Submit someone else's work to a professor as if it were your own.**
- **Replace words in a text (paraphrase) without acknowledging the original author.**
- **Copy any type of multimedia content** (images, audio, video, websites, software, music, graphics, etc.) **without crediting the source.**
- **Combine phrases, ideas, or statements** from multiple sources to create a new work without proper citation.
- **Base your work on someone else's idea or argument without citing the original author.**

Preventing plagiarism:

Using Bibliographic management tools helps you:

- Keep track of all the sources you use.
- Insert in-text citations and bibliographies correctly.
- Follow academic citation styles consistently.
